Client Story: Yocelyn Alvarez

Yocelyn has been connected with Valley Center for the Blind (VCB) for about a year and a half. Born blind, she has approached life with determination, resilience, and a strong drive for independence. Raised in Mexico, she attended school despite limited support for students who were blind or had low vision. With her mother's help in earlier years and later by advocating to attend high school independently, Yocelyn showed courage and confidence from a young age.

After moving to the United States, Yocelyn has worked hard to learn English and build connections, using technology to form friendships and grow more independent. Since joining VCB, she has participated in assistive technology and Independent Living Skills training, learning to

navigate technology, cook, and manage daily tasks. She continues to thrive academically while adapting to a new language and environment.

Known for her cheerful personality, sense of humor, and positive attitude, Yocelyn encourages others to attend VCB. She believes the center is vital to the community, providing a supportive and empowering space where individuals who are blind or visually impaired can build skills, confidence, and independence.

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


Dear Friends of VCB,

In 2026, we know that our community of people with disabilities will face new potential concerns, as we await clarity on how critical support programs and services will fair. At the end of 2025, the California Department of Rehabilitation (DOR) announced that as of February an "Order of Selection" for new vocational rehabilitation applicants will be implemented. Order of Selection (OOS) is a federally mandated process that state agencies such as DOR must implement when they do not have sufficient resources- staff or funding- to serve all eligible individuals. This means that some applicants for DOR services will have to be put on a waiting list before they can start receiving services. It is important to note that under OOS, individuals with the most significant disabilities are given priority access to DOR services.

For VCB, we are grateful to have the peace of mind to know that individuals who are blind or low vision will be a top priority under OOS and are not likely to face impact to their training or support through DOR. For other individuals facing a disability, it may take some time before they are able to get access to these services. As we discussed at our recent staff Town Hall, VCB will continue working hard to ensure the same level of care and service to people living with visual impairment in California through advocacy, innovative programming, and a strong, sustainable service model. We are grateful for our ongoing partnership with DOR and all that we are able to do to serve this state together.

Will You Help Us Protect This Important Work?

Dear Friends of VCB,

Recently, I shared updates about the important work ahead as we continue our mission to **support, train, and employ people who are blind or have low vision**. Year after year—now **seven years in a row**—VCB has seen the number of people receiving services grow significantly.

VCB is proud of the **strong foundation** we've built through earned revenue. Through contracts and fee-for-service partnerships, we have expanded high-quality programs, offered competitive wages and benefits, and created more employment opportunities. This is especially meaningful because **more than 75% of VCB's staff are people who are blind or have low vision**.

This year, major shifts in government priorities resulted in **unexpected reductions** to some of our earned-revenue programs. These changes **threaten the stability of critical disability services** for people who are blind across the Central Valley.

David—pictured seated second from the right—shared his story at one of our recent Dining in the Dark events. He said:



"I worked to get a job for more than a year, interviewing over and over and not getting hired due to lack of work experience. I was excited when VCB offered me the document conversion project, allowing me to gain experience. Now, I enjoy my job because I get to help individuals learn how to communicate in a work setting and help them like VCB helped me. I hope people support VCB so others can regain their independence and find employment, just like I did."


